

## Ordinance 38-19

An Ordinance amending 1 MLBSA § 2 to recognize the authority of a District Court Judge of the Court of Central Jurisdiction to issue warrants.

The District III Representative introduced the following Bill on the 9<sup>th</sup> day of July, 2019.

### Preamble

It is enacted by the Band Assembly of the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe, for the purpose of amending 1 MLBSA § 2 to recognize the authority of a District Court Judge of the Court of Central Jurisdiction to issue warrants. The statutory requirements mandated in 3 MLBSA § 16(a) including the requirement that the Band Assembly “conduct formal hearings on any bill which alters, amends, or repeals Titles 1, 3, 4, and 5, Chapter 1 of Title 2 and Subchapters I to III of Chapter 3 of Title 24 of the Mille Lacs Band Statutes Annotated” have been fulfilled and the Band Assembly may take formal action on this bill.

The statute currently reads:

§ 2. All persons within the territories under the jurisdiction of the Non-Removable Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa Indians have the right to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects against unreasonable search and seizures. Any warrant shall be issued by a Justice of the Court of Central Jurisdiction and shall be founded upon probable cause supported by oath or affirmation, shall describe with particularity the place to be searched and the person or thing to be seized.


The statute shall now read:

§ 2. All persons within the territories under the jurisdiction of the Non-Removable Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe Indians have the right to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects against unreasonable search and seizures. Any warrant shall be issued by a judge of the District Court of the Court of Central Jurisdiction and shall be founded upon probable cause supported by oath or affirmation, shall describe with particularity the place to be searched and the person or thing to be seized.
