COMMISSIONER'S ORDER NO. 135-90 Natural Resources

A Commissioner's Order to regulate the opening and closing of the Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa Indians Wild Rice Gathering Season for the year 1990.

WHEREAS: the Commissioner of Natural Resources has the power to open

and close wild rice gathering within the jurisdiction of the Mille

Lacs Band of Chippewa Indians, through Band Statute

1162-MLC-50, Section 3, and;

WHEREAS: members of the Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa Indians rely on the

gathering of wild rice for food and religious purposes, and;

WHEREAS: the taking of wild rice should be done with the preservation of

the rice bed foremost, and;

WHEREAS: the harvesting of ripe rice is essential to the preservation of the

rice bed.

NOW THEREFORE, by the authority vested in me by the Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa Indians under tribal law, I, Don Wedll, Commissioner of Natural Resources for the Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa Indians hereby prescribe the following opening and closing dates for harvesting wild rice within the jurisdiction of the

Mille Lacs Band of Chippewa Indians:

Ricing hours will be between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. on lakes open to ricing.
