RESOLUTION 06-02-18-95

A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE 1989-90 MICHIGAN WATERS LAKE SUPERIOR FISHING AGREEMENT.

WHEREAS, the Mille Lacs Reservation Band Assembly is the duly elected governing body of the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe Indians, and;

WHEREAS, the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe Indians is a signatory or a successor in interest to the Treaty of 1842, 7 Stat. 591; and,

WHEREAS, the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe Indians is committed to protecting and conserving the treaty resources reserved by the Tribe pursuant to that Treaty; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe Indians supports the 1989-90 Michigan Waters Lake Superior Fishing Agreement, as amended, entered into by the Red Cliff, Bad River and Keweenaw Bay Tribes and recommends that those Tribes enter into the same agreement for the 1994-95 fishing year as an interim measure to ensure protection and conservation of the 1842 Treaty fishery; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe Indians prefers good faith intertribal negotiations for achieving a fair resolution of the complex issues involved with the 1842 Treaty fishery in the Michigan waters of Lake Superior.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, we, the Administrative Policy Board hereunto cause to have set the signature of the Chief Executive to be affixed to this resolution and forwarded to the Band Assembly for concurrence.
